

NOTES ON CHINESE
PERSONALITIES

Dr. Chu Min-yi has been appointed to represent the National Government at the forthcoming Belgian National Commercial Exposition.

Admiral Yang Shu-tuang, Minister of Navy and Governor of Fukien, has returned to Shanghai from Nanking.

Mr. Ho Lin-yih has been made assistant manager of the China Travel Service. Mr. Ho is a returned student from America.

Messrs. Yang Tze-chih, Hu Kung-hu, Chen Kuo-yu and Huang Chih-tao have been elected members of the Board of Directors of the Chun Chih University.

Mr. Li Yen-huan has been appointed superintendent of the Woosung Water Police, succeeding Mr. Wu Hao-ming, who has resigned on account of illness.

Mr. Anselm Chuh, Chinese secretary to the American Commercial Attaché will return to-day from a visit to Nanking, where he attended the National Economic Conference.

Messrs. Y. M. Chien, Z. C. Zing, Hsu Fuh and Yao Yung-pah have been made directors of the Greater Shanghai Municipal Bank and Messrs. Wu Chen-shiu and O. K. Yui, supervisors.

Mr. Yang Yuan-hsun, president of the Pui Ching Academy Alumni Association, and local members are preparing to hold a meeting on Sunday to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the foundation of that institution.

Gen. Chang Chun, Mayor of Greater Shanghai, is giving a dinner on Monday night to members of the foreign press at the Bankers Club in Hongkong Road. Last night, he entertained a party of local merchants and bankers at the same place.

Dr. Lin Ping, Mr. S. K. Chen, Gen. Chang Chun, Mr. Hsu Moh, Mr. Yu Ya-ching, Mr. Wang Hsiao-lan, Mr. Tong Shao-yi, Mr. Quo Tai-chi and a large number of other foreign and Chinese members of the local community were entertained by Senator Manuel Quezon, president of the Philippines Legislature, at the Cathay Hotel yesterday evening.

The Rev. Chung Wing-kwong, president of the Canton Christian College and director of the Bureau of Overseas Affairs, will receive from St. John's University the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws in December on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the inauguration of St. John's Mr. Chang, who is a Hanlin of the old school, is one of the leading Chinese Christians of the present time.

LITTLE HAUL

Eight Thousand Dollars Stolen by Armed Robbers

Eight thousand dollars in notes was the haul made by several armed robbers who visited the Ying Chang Match Co.'s No. 2 Factory in Pootung on Wednesday night. The money was intended for the payment of the factory workers.

The bandits arrived shortly after ten o'clock when most of the workers had retired. A couple of watchmen were on duty at the time and several officers of the company were preparing to go to bed when there was a loud knocking of the door. Thinking that some of the workers who had gone out had returned, the watchmen opened the door, whereupon the robbers entered and, after intimidating the inmates with pistols, bound them with ropes. One was left on guard whilst the others forced an entry into the treasury, where they gathered \$600. From the safe, they extracted a cash-box containing more than \$7,500.

Leaving the watchmen and the employees tied up, they made a hasty exit, saying "Good bye. We are all Kompo brothers. We can use the money just as well as you." One of the employees managed to loosen his bonds and to notify the police, but, by the time the latter arrived, the birds had already flown.
